Honoring our Veterans

The Polish Heritage Center's commitment to veterans began with visionary founder Bishop John W. Yanta and his passionate desire to memorialize those from the Heritage communities who served, beginning with the Civil War through the present day.

Veterans come from all parts of the country. They grow up in the humblest backgrounds or the most privileged, in rural areas, small towns and large communities. Many have graduated from high school, community colleges, or major universities. Others have minimal education.

Many factors drive "joining up", including the desire to learn a skill or trade, earn pay and benefits, experience travel, make straight a life path, follow in a family member's footsteps, or in the past, being drafted. But buried in that decision process, there has been and always will be a spark of patriotism, a desire to serve America.

Some veterans have ancestors who came to America centuries ago. Others are newer Americans whose parents or grandparents immigrated from places as far-reaching as Poland, Ireland, Germany, Mexico, Vietnam or Lebanon. Some come from families with long traditions of military service and are fourth or fifth-generation soldiers, Marines, sailors, or airmen. Others are the first of their families ever to wear the uniform.

The life-altering decision to join the military, and the experience that comes with it, are private. Many veterans carry their memories within their heads and hearts and are proud to share them with friends and family. Some choose not to because of the trauma they suffered or witnessed. However, there is one attribute that they all possess, and that is pride in having served. That pride and mutual respect for fellow veterans, regardless of branch of service, welds them together in a camaraderie that only they understand.


What does it mean to be a Veteran? It means sacrifice. It means you've put your life at risk. It means you still get goosebumps when you see a military fly-by or hear the national anthem. It means believing in what America stands for. It means you take it seriously when you fly your American flag on the 4th of July, Memorial Day, and Veterans Day. It means that even though your body may be riddled with problems or pains, you would do it all over again.

Remember President Abraham Lincoln's admonition: "Honor to the soldier and sailor everywhere who bravely bears his country's cause; any nation that does not honor its heroes will not long endure."
